
### UNIVERSITY DISTRICT YMCA NEEDS YOUR (OUR) HELP!

Over the years since the U District was UpZoned, in spite of repeated requests from UPCC, the City of Seattle, the University of Washington, the UDP, and the UDCC have been in denial regarding the local YMCA—its needs to be expanded and updated, its focal point for encouraging families to move in, and its past contributions to local residents. Even though the YMCA was given a must-needed rezone at that time for its ambitious plans, no efforts have been made beyond that point. I was unable to obtain any plans, even outline sketches, or a definite commitment to including pools. They do need to still acquire several lots to the north of them, so I am not sure about their financial situation or their efforts to start a major Fund Raising Event.

If we wish to remain a family neighborhood on the northeast edge abutting the U District, the YMCA would be a terrific asset toward the fulfillment of the new OneSeattlePlan. This plan proposes an increase in density within our neighborhood, up to four-plexes, in order to encourage families to move in, especially low-income families, intergenerational families, and larger families who seek a more permanent community in which to raise the children and care for their elderly.

## The Past reveals the present, but does it dictate the future?



"The University District (sometimes known as the U District) is a group of neighborhoods in Seattle named after the main campus of the University of Washington (UW). The University of Washington moved in two years after the area was seized by Seattle, when much of it was still clear cut forest or stump farms. The neighborhood district grew alongside the institution to resemble a miniature version of major American cities." (Source: https://www.mapofseattle.com) (red emphases are mine.)

#### **DID YOU KNOW....?**

- As a result of a contest held by the University Commercial Club in 1919, 14th Avenue (by then already known as "The Avenue" or "The Ave") was renamed University Way, and the neighborhood was renamed the University District. An alternative proposal was to rename the area "UniverCity," in recognition of the urban feel of the district and the major commercial presence along its main streets. (Source: Wikipedia)
- Brooklyn Ave was once called Broadway the developer James Moore (1861-1929)
- The University District (commonly the U District) is a neighborhood and a major district in central northeastern Seattle, Washington, comprising several distinct neighborhoods. (Wikimedia)
- The present University of Washington campus was laid out as the Brooklyn Addition. This land was owned by real estate developer James A. Moore, his wife, and the Clise Investment Company and included much of the original Brownfield homestead. This central area was called Brooklyn, which gave the current Brooklyn Avenue in the neighborhood its name.
- ◆ The old neighborhood name "Brooklyn" began to fade around this time. Electric trolley tracks had been laid up Columbus Avenue (later known as 14th Avenue, and later still University Way) either in 1891 or 1892, and the neighborhood soon began to be called "University Station" after the heated waiting house at the corner of what is now NE 42nd Street.

SO, ask yourself, "How should the University Park Neighborhood fit into the ever evolving University District and still remain a family community?" We need to retain our distinct and unique character, while remaining a welcoming respite to all residents and visitors from the cacophony of the U District.

How it could be an opportunity for University Park Neighborhood



University Park is NOT in the University Community, according to the Cityl The Comprehensive Plan 2035 created the Transition Zone to protect our neighborhood against the density increases in the District.

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#### WHAT TO SECURE AND RESIST:

- The transition zone: There are whispers that the City wants to get rid of this protection buffer.
- The character of our neighborhood: how will standardized designs adapt to our uniqueness?
- Our independence from the University Washington. NOTE: The U District's upzone is apparently not final; there is a addendum to the One Seattle Plan that the city "might propose additional zoning changes as part of a future phase of our Zoning Update". What will that do to the integrity of our residential neighborhood?
- The need for amenities to encourage families to become our neighbors: YMCA, schools, safe parks, gardens, yards, etc.
- Pedestrian-friendly features: inviting entrances to the streetscape, safe sidewalks, visibility, such as around corners, near appropriately-designed fencing; clearly defined curb cuts for driveways, etc.
- Prevention: The displacement of existing families to the advantage of speculators.
- Prevention of incompatible housing by requiring that developers and speculators meet with the neighborhood during the early stages of planning, long before the cement is poured. This includes DADUs and major additions. We need the option of creating very general design concepts

#### WHAT TO DEMAND:

- Insist that the City comply with its empty promises and goals: providing neighborhood housing for displaced families, especially low-income families, displaced families, intergenerational families, large families, and families with disabilities.
- University Park should be protected from the onslaught of development and influence by the neighboring UW. This includes the negative and permanent impact of the transient student population.
- That the City recognize the need for more permanent residents if a neighborhood can truly have an identity and create a true sense of community—something unattainable if it's population is transient in nature.

#### WHAT TO CAUTIOUSLY CELEBRATE!

- Apparently, the City views our neighborhood as fairly dense already and they don't anticipate any major changes here for a long time. Also, our hills present a challenge.
- 2. No lots in our neighborhood are expected to provide enough square footage for more than duplexes; six-plexes will be in areas around the light rail stations.
- 3. THEREFORE: It is up to us as a true community to rally together in solid support of our unique and vibrant neighborhood! The future is ours to create and protect.


